CATALOG DESCRIPTION

Microeconomics versus macroeconomics; major macroeconomic problems in an open economy. Measurement, analysis, and control of the overall levels of income, production, employment, and prices with a focus on the modern U.S. economy; monetary, fiscal and related policies for economic growth and stability.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

1. Students will understand the interactions among the basic subdivisions of the aggregate economy such as the government, business, household, and international sectors.
2. Students will understand the basic concepts of macroeconomics and their measurement. This includes NIPA accounting, unemployment, inflation, and growth.
3. Students will understand the basic determinants of long run growth.
4. Students will understand the concept of a business cycle. They will understand the various policies promoted to stabilize the economy in the short run. They will understand the controversies concerning stabilization policy.
5. Students will understand the definitions and functions of money and monetary policy. They will understand the Federal Reserve System.
6. Students will understand exchange rates and the basics of international finance.

LITERATURE REVIEW (10%)

You will be asked to write a 1000-to-1200-word (12 pt. Times New Roman font; single or double spaced; in a Word or Google doc) literature review on a macroeconomic topic or research question of your choice. **This will be due by email at the end of Fall Recess on 10/18 (Sunday) by 11:59 PM.** You must only include peer reviewed and published sources in this literature review. You will need to include in-text citations and a list of references at the end of your paper. Any citation style is fine (APA, Chicago, etc.). To search for articles, you can use Google Scholar, EconLit, Business Source Complete, etc. (the latter two are available through the university [here](#)). **Email me the topic or question you choose by 10/03 (This is worth 10 points of the project, i.e. 1 percent of your overall course grade).** A late literature review loses 10 points, out of 100, for each day it is late.

On AI: **usage of AI platforms such as ChatGPT or Google Gemini WILL be permitted for this project.** However, if you choose to use these platforms to help in your writing, I ask that you submit your original work and the AI altered version along with it. You will not lose points for doing this. Writing is not an easy skill to develop, and it requires practice, but AI is a tool that is here to stay. Learning to use it productively will be our challenge going forward. Any sources discovered

through AI “deep research” functions must be verified as accurate by the student, and the student is expected to have an understanding of the material they cite. In grading these assignments, I will be looking for the veracity of the sources cited and how they are represented in the context of the literature review.

ATTENDANCE & QUIZZES (15%)

You are expected to come to every class and as such attendance will be taken every class by a sign-in sheet. Additionally, there will be a **quiz each Thursday at the beginning of class** (except exam days), on either the reading for the class that day, or the pre-class video/audio assignments on BlueLine. These quizzes are to incentivize you to read the chapters as well as watch/listen to the pre-class assignments. I will drop the two lowest quiz scores, which includes those you missed. The quizzes will only be held at the beginning of class and cannot be made up without an excused absence.

Quizzes are open notes, but **handwritten notes only**: notes taken on an electronic device and then printed out are permitted; notes viewed on an electronic device are not.

HOMEWORK (25%)

There will be homework each week a chapter is concluded. For each question on a homework assignment: you are allowed unlimited attempts on each question, but will lose 5 percent of the points possible for the question each time you’re wrong. **Homework can be found on the class BlueLine and must be submitted by the dates listed in the schedule section by 11:59 PM.** Once you begin a homework assignment, until it is completed you can take as long as you like (within the availability window) and even log out and then come back to it later. Achieve accepts late work up to seven days after the deadline, with a penalty of 10 percent of the score for each day late; after seven days the assignment closes. I will drop your two lowest homework scores.

EXAMS (50%)

There will be only one **midterm, in class on Thursday, October 8**—the last meeting before Fall Recess. It is worth 25% of your grade and will cover chapters 6, 8, 9, 11, 12, 13, and 14 and any other class material prior to its date.

The **final exam** for this section will be on **Friday, December 11, from 8:00 to 9:40 AM** in our regular classroom, per the Registrar’s Fall 2026 final exam schedule (TR 9:30–10:45 AM time block). The final is worth 25% of your grade and will **NOT** be cumulative, covering only chapters 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, and 20 and any other class material covered from the midterm onward.

Exams will be a combination of multiple choice and short answer. A basic (non-programmable) calculator is suggested for the exam. Phones are not calculators.

Exams are open notes on the same terms as the quizzes: **handwritten or printed notes only**. Notes viewed on an electronic device are not permitted.

POLICY ON MAKE-UP EXAMS/QUIZZES

Make-up examinations will be administered only for university excused absences and in cases of emergency, as deemed by the instructor. In the event that a student misses an exam due to a university-sponsored event or a religious holy day observance, the student must contact me a week prior to the exam and provide me with any necessary documentation.

Times New Roman font; single or double spaced; in a Word or Google doc) summary of your thoughts on the talk, or just a summary of the talk itself. **This summary must be written in your own words; use of AI will not be permitted.** If you attend all three seminars during the semester, you will obtain an additional extra credit point on top of the three points earned, for a total of four possible points.

Remember bias is embedded in the creation of these systems; it is also possible you may encounter harmful language and ideas. AI platforms can produce inaccurate or false information. It is important that you research any information and sources provided by an AI tool on your own to verify its accuracy. Many of these tools also retain the rights to use your information and the content shared with them in a variety of ways, so also consider possible privacy and copyright issues.

Cite all AI tools when used or referred to in assigned work. See [How to Cite ChatGPT from the APA](#) for examples. Identify

the way it contributed to your work. For example, you can include a statement that you asked an AI tool to identify any grammatical or spelling errors in your writing, or that you used it to find thought starters for your assignment. Any unauthorized use of generative AI tools for preparing written assignments will be considered a violation of the University and College academic misconduct policies and will result in disciplinary action.
